

Survey on Press Freedom under the Tsang Administration (2005-12)

Survey Period: 18/4 - 4/5

Methodology:

- Questionnaires distributed in newsrooms by HKJA staff member and fellow reporters in different media outlets.
- E-Questionnaires sent to HKJA freelance members.
- Hong Kong Press Photographers Association also sent e-questionnaires to their members on behalf of HKJA.

Target: Reporters, Editors, Photographers, Editorial Managements

No. of questionnaires and e-questionnaires distributed: 1,154

No. of questionnaires returned: 663

*There are questions that need not be answered by all respondents in which case the actual number of respondents is indicated within parenthesis after the question.
